Welcome to ViSN, a network of Catholic Education Western Australia (CEWA) secondary schools who work together to deliver online courses to Year 11 and Year 12 students.

ViSN provides students with the opportunity to engage in studies not available at their own school and in doing so, helps them build their technology skills, their ability to work independently and expands their network within the CEWA system.

Online learning is of particular benefit in transitioning to further study, especially university, where more and more courses are being delivered online.

This handbook outlines the way ViSN works, the benefits of online study and the courses available to study in 2026.

How does ViSN work?

Students remain enrolled at their own school but register for a ViSN online course, taught by a teacher in another WA Catholic school.

ViSN courses are compliant with SCSA requirements and can be used towards the calculation of WACE. In other words, they are no different to the courses delivered in a face-to-face classroom. A ViSN course is one of the 5 or 6 courses that are a part of the student's total study program. Someone at your school will check that your ViSN course will help you meet WACE requirements.



Mandurah Catholic College ViSN students



ViSN teachers are available daily to answer questions, provide feedback, monitor progress and provide assistance.

Student access to learning



Students and Teachers use a Microsoft product called Teams. It is where they can communicate with their teacher and classmates, access documents, upload assignments for marking and access their course Class Notebook.



Teachers use a digital notebook called Class Notebook to create their lessons, which students then access on a daily basis. Students work with classmates in the collaborative part of the Class Notebook and independently in their own private section of the Class Notebook. The teacher can see all work and monitors progress daily.

ViSN Events

Each year, CEWA offers the Year 11 ViSN students the opportunity to attend a two day camp in Perth. The camp is held in Week 9 of Term 4 of the year before ViSN enrolment starts.

The purpose of the camp is to:

- create an opportunity for students and teachers to connect in person, which is beneficial to online student success;
- help students become familiar with their ViSN course design and its requirements, key concepts and teacher expectations; and
- provide students with opportunities to participate in activities not necessarily available to them in their own school, which may aid their transition to post-school options.

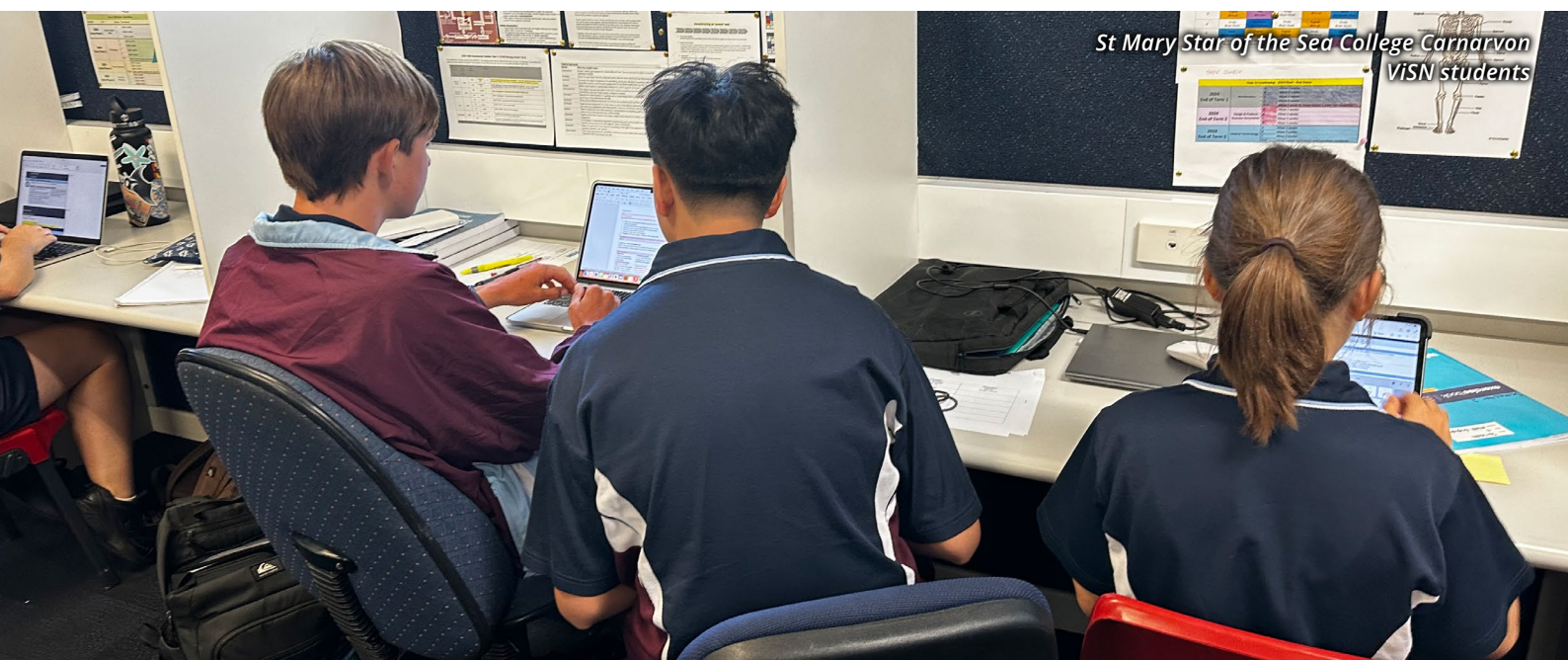
Each year, CEWA offers the Year 12 ViSN students the opportunity to attend a half day, online workshop on maximising Semester 2. The workshop is held after Semester 1 exams.

The purpose of this day is to:

- create an opportunity for students and teachers to connect over an extended period, which is beneficial to online student success;
- receive detailed in-person feedback on their Semester 1 exam, from their ViSN teacher; and
- provide students with opportunities to hear from local universities, career advisors and TISC.

Whilst these events are not compulsory, all students are encouraged to attend. Students who have attended previous ViSN camps have reported:

- a greater sense of connection to their teacher and classmates; and
- increased confidence in online learning due to knowing how their teacher works and a familiarisation with their course structure and content.



Support for students



ViSN Teacher

Only a message, email, Teams call or phone call away.

School-Based ViSN Mentor

Available as your school contact. They will support you to progress as planned and help administer assessments.



Tech Support

Your school may have a tech specialist who can help you with ICT issues.

Your parents/guardians will be able to support you, particularly at home, to ensure you are on track.



Online Course Classmates

Those doing the same online course as you can be a big help if you've got a question or need to clarify something.

ViSN FAQs

What are the benefits of studying through ViSN?

- Being able to adjust your workflow to suit your time schedule.
- Learning that suits your needs.
- You get to study a course your school may not offer.
- Study with students from other Catholic schools around the state.
- Be better prepared for the transition to university learning, as many university courses now deliver a majority of the content online.

Do the ViSN courses have prerequisites?

Most of the courses have prerequisites, to give you an idea of the level you need to be operating at to be successful in the course. See the course outlines further in this book for details. All students also need to complete the ViSN Readiness Module as part of the prerequisites to enrol in ViSN.

Is there a teacher?

Yes, ViSN teachers are based in their own school but are available to you via Teams message, email, Teams call or phone. They will let you know when they are available each day to answer your questions and they will be in regular contact with you each week, to see if you need help or have any questions.

What does a normal week look like when studying a ViSN course?

You will be timetabled by your own school for 5 periods a week. For 4 of those periods, you work independently and/or with other virtual students doing your course. Your teacher will let you know what has to be completed by the end of each lesson. One lesson each week will be for you to connect online with your ViSN teacher and all other ViSN students doing the same course.

Will someone from my own school support me?

Of course! Your own ViSN mentor will ensure you know where to go for your ViSN lesson, chat with you about your progress or any concerns you have, help you where they can and make sure you're keeping up with the work. They will work closely with your ViSN teacher too.

How do I access my ViSN course?

Once you have met prerequisites, at the beginning of the school year you will be sent an email and Teams invite by your teacher to join the class.

Myth Busting!

Online study is for everyone.

Some students are better suited to studying online than others. This is because not everyone is a self-motivated, independent studier! With commitment, these skills can be developed. See pages 14 –15 of this handbook to see what other skills you need to be successful online.

I'll be learning on my own.

This is not the case in ViSN! Our teachers ensure there are plenty of opportunities for you to work online with others in your course. You will get to know your online classmates well and you will be able to contact each other too.

It will be hard to get hold of my teacher.

While not in the same school as you, your ViSN teacher is just as accessible as your other teachers. You can contact them anytime during school hours and they will get back to you within 24 hours (but it's usually within the next hour in reality!).

You have to be tech savvy to study online.

While it helps to have some basic tech understanding, it's not a criteria for being successful online. You will be shown how Teams and OneNote (our main tools) work during orientation, and your teachers and classmates will help you too.

Online classes are second rate, or not as good as face to face classes.

There is plenty of research from online schools around the world that says otherwise! ViSN is no exception – our data to date says that our students are doing just as well in their ViSN classes, as compared to their face to face classes and in some cases, even better!

I won't know my teacher.

You will get to know your teacher well, perhaps even better than some of your face to face

teachers! You will get a chance to meet them in person at Year 11 Camp and they are skilled at developing connections with their students in the online environment.

The technology won't work.

CEWA has done a lot of work to ensure that all students (online or not) have improved internet access. There are times when things don't go according to plan but don't let internet connection stop you – there is always a plan B in place! In addition to internet access at home and at school, you'll need access to a laptop or desktop computer (yes, you need to do work at home, just like your other courses!).

You can't study this course online.

Most of SCSA courses can be taught online, or we would not be offering it! The ViSN teachers go through a year of training before they start teaching you online, so they know all the clever ways to create engaging online lessons for you.

My parents won't know my teacher.

Your parents will have plenty of opportunities to meet your ViSN teacher, via email, Teams calls, parent/teacher/student meetings online and the phone. ViSN teachers will contact your parents at the start of the year and share their contact details, so your parents are welcome to contact them at any time... just like in your face to face school.

No one will be there to check on me.

You are going to have plenty of support while you study online. Your school will appoint a staff member as the ViSN mentor and they are your school-based support, ensuring you are on track, that your technology is working, that you are handing in assessments on time, that you do not need any help with content etc. In addition, your ViSN teachers are only a message away and are always keen to help. Your teacher will check your work daily and provide feedback, and your mentor will check on you regularly too.

RELIGION AND LIFE

11 ATAR

Course Content

Unit 1

The focus of this unit is the place of religion in society. It examines the responses of people to religion, in particular how people understand the response of religion to their concerns, needs and questions.

Unit 2

The focus of this unit is religious identity and purpose. It investigates how religion shapes, forms and supports people in life. The unit also examines how religion impacts on and interacts with, groups in society.

Prerequisite

C grade in Year 10 Religious Education.

C grade in Year 10 English.

Schools will discuss suitability for online learning with interested students.

RELIGION AND LIFE

11 GENERAL

Course Content

Unit 1

The focus for this unit is religion as a human activity. It explores how people search for meaning in life and the characteristics of religion. Students conduct research and develop the skills required for processing information and communicating findings about religion and life.

Unit 2

The focus of this unit is the role religion plays in society. It considers the responses offered by religion to issues that exist in society. Students conduct research and develop the skills required for processing information and communicating findings about religion and life.

Prerequisite

No prerequisite.

RELIGION AND LIFE

12 ATAR

Course Content

Unit 3

The focus for this unit is the connection between past and present experiences of religion. Students analyse the impact of changes within society and how these changes shape the way individuals and groups interact with religion. They further develop research skills for conducting an inquiry, processing information, and communicating findings about the interplay between religion and life.

Unit 4

This unit centers on the relationship between religion and society, with a focus on how religion responds to and interacts with contemporary issues. Students will examine the interplay between religion and life and develop research skills for conducting inquiries, processing information, and communicating their findings about this connection.

Prerequisite

C grade in Year 11 ATAR Religion and Life.

Schools will discuss suitability for online learning with interested students.

ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE

11 ATAR

Course Content

Unit 1

The focus for this unit is on double entry accounting for small businesses. Students apply their understanding of financial principles, systems and institutions to manage financial information and make decisions in a variety of small businesses.

Unit 2

The focus for this unit is on accrual accounting. Students apply financial systems and principles to the operations of businesses and distinguish between cash and accrual methods of accounting.

Prerequisite

C grade in Year 10 WA Curriculum HASS.

C grade in Year 10 WA Curriculum Mathematics.

Schools will discuss suitability for online learning with interested students.

ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE

12 ATAR

Course Content

Unit 3

The focus for this unit is on internal management for business. Decision-making processes using cost accounting techniques are a feature of the unit.

Unit 4

The focus for this unit is on Australian reporting entities and how they are regulated by the *Corporations Act 2001* and regulatory bodies. The reporting requirements of companies form a large part of the unit. The unit also addresses corporate social disclosure issues and ethical behaviour within corporations.

Prerequisite

C grade in Year 11 ATAR Accounting and Finance.

An understanding of the Year 11 content is assumed knowledge for students in Year 12. It is recommended that students studying Unit 3 and Unit 4 have completed Unit 1 and Unit 2.

BIOLOGY

11 ATAR

Course Content

Unit 1 - Ecosystems and biodiversity

In this unit, students analyse abiotic and biotic ecosystem components and their interactions, using classification systems for data collection, comparison and evaluation.

Unit 2 - Single cells and multicellular organisms

In this unit, students investigate the interdependent components of the cell system and the multiple interacting systems in multicellular organisms.

Prerequisite

C grade in Year 10 WA Curriculum Science.

Schools will discuss suitability for online learning with interested students.

BIOLOGY

12 ATAR

Course Content

Unit 3 - Continuity of species

Students investigate mechanisms of heredity and the ways in which inheritance patterns can be explained, modelled and predicted; they connect these patterns to population dynamics and apply the theory of evolution by natural selection in order to examine changes in populations. Underpinning this is the understanding of the DNA molecule and how biotechnology can be used to explore genetic disease, advanced in agriculture and conservation genetics.

Unit 4 - Surviving in a changing environment

Students investigate system change and continuity in response to changing external conditions and pathogens. They examine homeostasis and adaptations for thermoregulation and water balance. They will gain an understanding of infectious disease and its spread of at the population level with a focus on 8 specific diseases.

Prerequisite

C grade in Year 11 ATAR Biology.

An understanding of the Year 11 content is assumed knowledge for students in Year 12.

Schools will discuss suitability for online learning with interested students.

Course Levy

The course levy is \$30.

BUSINESS MANAGEMENT AND ENTERPRISE

11 GENERAL

Course Content

Unit 1

The focus of this unit is on establishing a small business in Australia. Opportunities are provided to explore business start-ups and to recognise the factors that contribute to business success. Entrepreneurship and innovative thinking are introduced, generating ideas and proposals that may be suitable for business ventures. These proposals are then developed into a business plan.

Unit 2

The focus of this unit is on operating a small business in Australia. The unit is suited to the running of a small business in the school or local environment, or to the use of business simulations. The concepts of innovation, marketing and competitive advantage and the key factors that influence consumer decision making are introduced. Legal aspects of running a small business, including rights and responsibilities of employer and employee, are investigated.

No prerequisite.

CERTIFICATE II CREATIVE INDUSTRIES

11 or 12 VET

Course Content

Students will complete 10 units: three core and seven electives, to gain skills for various roles in the creative industries such as entertainment customer service, TV and radio production, social media and film production.

Possible Units of Competency:

- Develop and apply creative arts industry knowledge – Core Unit
- Apply work health and safety practices – Core Unit
- Work effectively with others – Core Unit
- Use social media tools for collaboration and engagement
- Develop drawing skills to communicate ideas
- Maintain interactive content
- Plan and prepare for work readiness
- Follow a design process
- Perform basic sound editing
- Develop and apply thinking and problem-solving skills

CERTIFICATE II TOURISM

11 or 12 VET

Course Content

Students will complete 11 units of competency – five core units and six electives – to complete the Certificate II in Tourism in the one year. This is available to both Year 11 and Year 12 students in the same class.

Units of Competency:

- Source and use information on the tourism and travel industry
- Provide customer information and assistance
- Interact with customers
- Show social and cultural sensitivity
- Participate in safe work practices

Prerequisite

No prerequisite.

Schools will discuss suitability for online learning with interested students.

CERTIFICATE II WORKPLACE SKILLS

11 or 12 VET

Course Content

Students will complete 10 units of competency that will allow them to run their own small business venture during the year.

Units of Competency:

- Apply communication skills

This unit develops an understanding of human cognition, emotion, and behaviour to inform improvements in the wellbeing of individuals and groups in society. Students explore the relationships between stress, sleep, and wellbeing. Psychological models and techniques are learnt to improve wellbeing in several contexts. The unit emphasises the role and relevance of science inquiry, where the psychological research is applied to contemporary concerns.

Prerequisite

C grade in Year 11 ATAR Psychology.

An understanding of the Year 11 content is assumed knowledge for students in Year 12. It is recommended that students studying Unit 3 and Unit 4 have completed Unit 1 and Unit 2.

Schools will discuss suitability for online learning with interested students.

SCIENCE IN PRACTICE

11 GENERAL

Course Content

This course is divided into two units, each of one semester duration. Each unit will integrate at least two of the science disciplines – Biology, Chemistry, Earth Science and Physics with a minimum of three different science disciplines integrated into the pair of units. Each unit can be taught in different contexts or one context over the year. The organization of the themes will be determined based on enrolments.

Suggested Course Themes

A. Two units on different themes:

- Each unit integrates two science disciplines, and four different science disciplines are integrated into the pair of units e.g. Unit 1 – World of Waves (Physics and Biology) and Unit 2 – Local Geology (Earth Science and Chemistry)

B. Two units on the same theme in different contexts:

- Each unit integrates two science disciplines, and three different science disciplines are integrated into the pair of units e.g. Unit 1 – Marine Biology (Biology and Chemistry) and Unit 2 – Marine Ecology (Biology and Earth Science)

C. Two units taught concurrently in the same context:

- Four different science disciplines are integrated into the pair of units e.g. Unit 1 and 2 – Forensic Science (Chemistry, Physics, Biology and Earth Science)

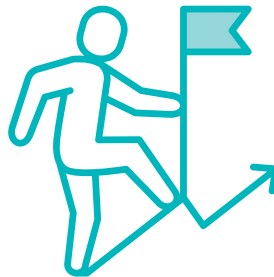

FUNDAMENTALS OF ACADEMIC WRITING

CURTIN UNIREADY

Year 12 Elective Units

Elective Unit Overview

For Year 12, students will select 2 of the units below. More detail will be provided prior to enrolment.

Introduction to Humanities

This unit explores the interrelationships of people with and within systems. Students will explore themes related to society, culture, environment and technology and their reciprocal impacts. The unit seeks to develop students understanding of self as part of diverse and complex systems viewed through a critical lens.

Introduction to Commerce

This unit will provide an introduction to the fundamentals of economics, marketing, law, and accounting principles. The unit will focus on the basic concepts and techniques in accounting that apply to business; law with a business context; as well as giving attention to the basic principles relating to economics. Students will be shown how to apply basic economic, marketing, legal and accounting concepts to practical situations therefore shedding light on key commercial operations.

Introduction to Health Sciences

This unit will provide students with a basic understanding of some of the human anatomy and physiology components of an undergraduate Health Sciences program. This includes an overview of the structure and function of human anatomy and physiology, focused on musculo-skeletal, cardiovascular, respiratory, nervous, digestive, endocrine and immune systems. Human cell biology and homeostasis will also be investigated.

Prerequisite

Students must be studying ATAR English for the duration of the Curtin UniReady program (all 4 units).

Unit Levy

The course levy for each of the above units is \$100 per student.
